PATA 2024 Summit Aims

PATA summits connect healthcare providers from across Africa and provide a powerful platform for sharing experiences on the frontline, peer-to-peer learning, capacity building, and coordinated action to improve quality services and comprehensive care for caregivers, children, adolescents and young people.

1. Position frontline health providers as key partners and champions in ending AIDS by 2030.
2. Support healthcare providers to be champions and advocates for change as they close gaps in HIV service delivery and care.
3. Share updated guidance, tools and best practices from across our network and through the PATA hub.
4. Strengthen and grow the network, build collaborative teams, and partnership.
5. Promote a culture of care, exchange, linking and learning between countries and across the PATA network.

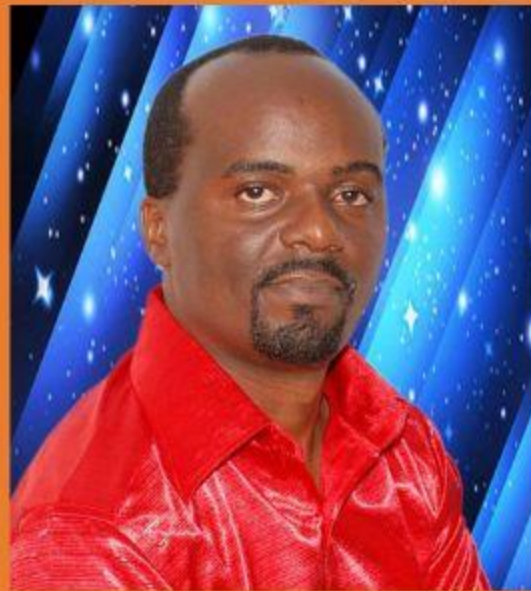

Day Themes and Focuses

DAY ONE

4 November

1. Together in care: Healthcare champions for children

Prime Session one provides a comprehensive overview of the Global Alliance to galvanise action and build a movement of champions. Country updates will provide a snapshot into Global Alliance progress and will highlight breakthrough strategies and how bottlenecks are managed and mitigated.

Africa Cafés highlight three priority interventions and related lessons in each of the four Global Alliance pillars the summit will focus on, sharing frontline experiences, best practise and open discussions on everyday challenges, whilst offering practical solutions to structural and operational barriers.

Workshop one on advocacy in action aims to impart simple advocacy skills and communication strategies on how to engage stakeholders to influence policies and practices. The workshop will identify ways to grow the PATA network as a collective movement with a united voice that can advocate together and localize linking and learning efforts.

DAY TWO

5 November

2. Mastering the matrix of interventions: A comprehensive care and quality service model

Prime Session two provides an overview of what a comprehensive service delivery package should include, sharing updates and country or programming lessons on case finding, treatment optimisation, the path to vertical transmission elimination (VTP) and other advancements in prevention tools and technologies.

Africa Cafés will follow the same format as day one.

Workshop two on unlocking data for effective quality improvement planning and monitoring aims to share examples and ways of utilising local data to inform service delivery improvements and integrate community-led monitoring approaches.

DAY THREE

6 November

3. Build a culture of care: Unity, resilience and solidarity

Prime Session three provides progress updates against 10-10-10 targets and the impact of structural and social barriers in service delivery. The session positions healthcare providers as important duty bearers who have a central responsibility in safeguarding children and young people as rights defenders and champions for change on the frontline, and places attention on the rights of healthcare providers to safe and supported working conditions.

Africa Cafés will follow the same format as day one.

Workshop three on unity, resilience and solidarity aims to underscore the significance and importance of healthcare provider wellbeing. It will explore strategies to integrate self-care and a peer support network that can provide supportive supervision and mentorship whilst building a culture of care and learning.

This year's summit returns to an in-person format, welcoming over 150 healthcare providers and partners from the PATA network, while also reaching our expanded network through a virtual connection via the **PATA Linking and Learning Hub**.

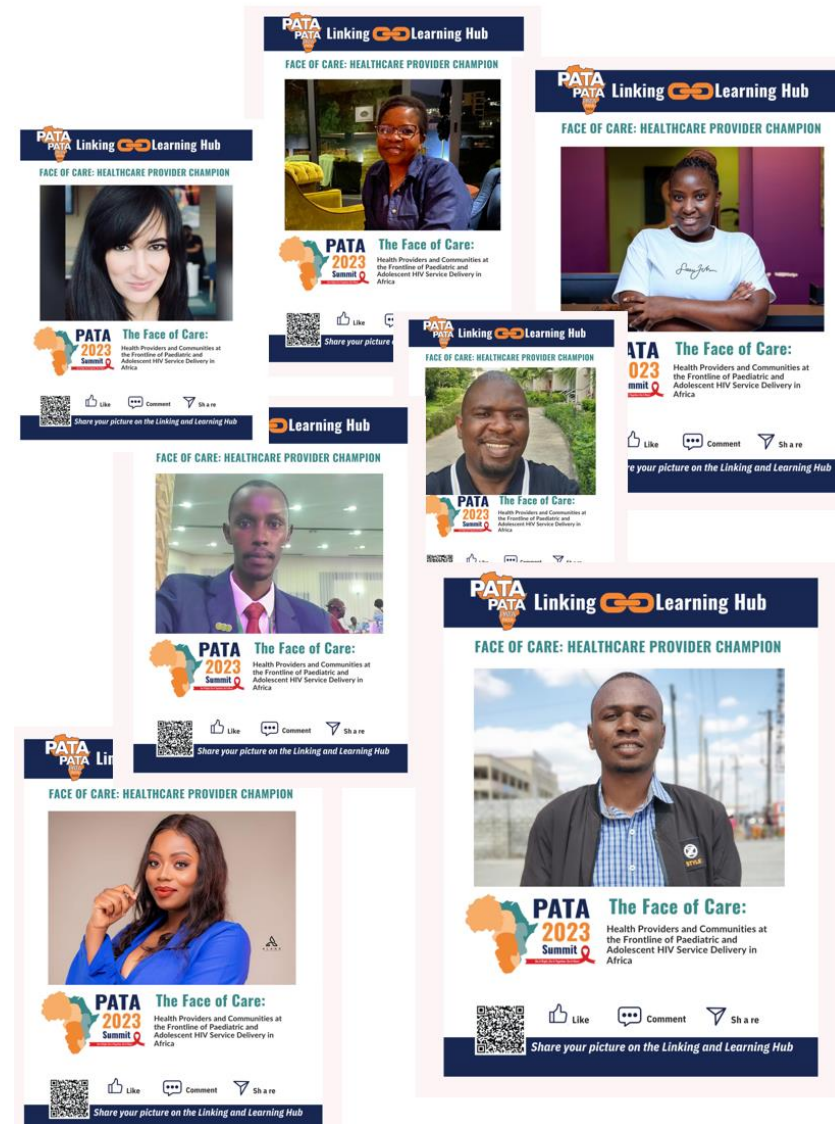

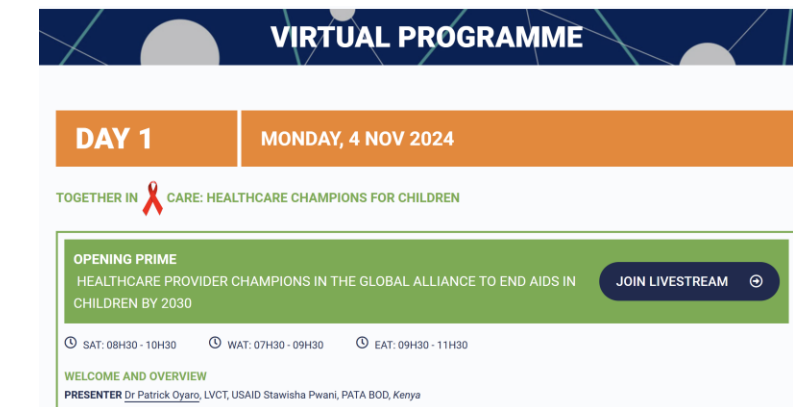

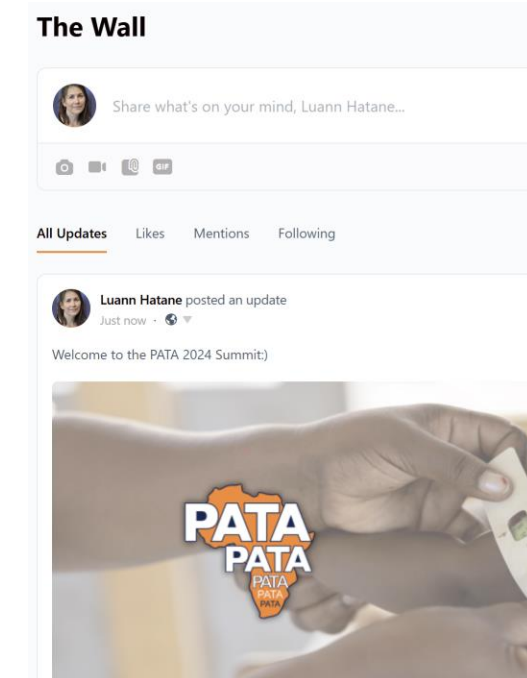
